Year 6 had a great time at River Dart with lots of exciting activities. They



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#### What has been happening at Christ the Sower this term?


#### **Celebrating the Arts**

It was Arts fortnight this term at Christ the Sower. They held a two week celebration of the arts across the school, based around the theme of

'IDENTITY'.

All classes worked towards art outcomes that express identity. The school held a portrait day, where all classes learned how to use the proportions of the human face to gain a true likeness and all year groups then went on to use those skills to create portraits inspired by great artists.

Across the two weeks, they also held poetry workshops, led both by their own English leader and Hazeley, their local secondary school. Children have also expressed their identity through drama, dance, and rap music.



Year one wrote some wonderful poetry reflecting on their place and identity at Christ the Sower. They challenged themselves to write an Acrostic, an 'I am' and a Cinquain poem. A Cinquain poem is a form of syllabic poetry characterised by its distinctive 5 line structure.

#### School Games Gold Award

Christ the Sower were also thrilled to be presented with the School Games Gold award to recognise the great work that has gone into PE

and Sport over the past year. A great achievement for the school and this shows off the hard work of the children and adults across the year. The children have taken part in many sporting events this year, including in Athletics. They competed in track and field events against other Milton Keynes schools and came away with lots of individual medals. The school team coming third overall was a fantastic achievement.

Many local businesses, pubs, clubs and community projects also join in the procession to make it a truly community-based event.



After the procession, comes the carnival day with amusements for all the family - such as a petting farm, bouncy castles, trampolines, face painting, henna designs and craft activities.

The staff at the school gladly stepped in to help with demonstrations.

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


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#### What has been happening at Great Horwood this term?

#### **Maples**

Maples have chosen their own topic to research this term: Under The Sea. This has been a rich and diverse topic; the children have explored everything



from habitats in danger, pollution in our seas and classifications of animals. As a result, we have written persuasive leaflets to help inform and advise people about the dangers of not reducing, re-using and recycling our waste correctly. Maples have created presentations using transitions, animations and a variety of visual stimuli to engage, educate and excite their audience.

#### **Conkers**

This half-term Conkers Class have loved learning all about the seaside in our topic 'Oh, we do like to be beside the seaside!'. In English, we read 'Ocean Meets Sky' by The Fan Brothers. The children have written character and setting descriptions, as well as their own fantasy story! In Art we have created pieces inspired by the seaside



and artists such as J. M. W. Turner. Our science topic this half-term is 'Living things and their habitats'. This meant that we spent a lot of time outdoors, exploring microhabitats and looking for minibeasts. We explored ponds, rivers, under logs and trees.



#### **Hawthorns**

On Thursday 25th May, the children enjoyed a fantastic trip to Whipsnade Zoo. The day before, in their small groups, the children planned their itinerary and route around the zoo using google maps to help schedule their day. When we arrived at the zoo, the children split off into their groups and started to explore the zoo. To conclude our day,

we were fortunate enough to have a Giraffe workshop where the children conducted a behaviour study of the giraffe herd using observation methods used by the ZSL scientists themselves!

#### **Acorns**

Acorns have also loved their Forest School sessions this term! They have loved exploring our conservation area, building shelters, making their own log slices (learning to use a screwdriver to achieve this!), playing games and, toasting their own marshmallows to make smores!

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#### What has been happening at Padbury this term?

#### Bushcraft Residential - Oak Class Year 3/4

conference and the ODBST charter with their peers back at school. Everyone that attended had a wonderful day and are already looking forward to next year's event.

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


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#### What has been happening at Thomas Harding this term?

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# What has been happening in the Shared Services Team this term? ODBST Eco Event

Oxford Diocesan Bucks Schools Trust (ODBST) were thrilled to host



their first annual ECO Conference this week. Children from schools across the county were welcomed to present the projects that had been taking place in their schools and help drive ODBSTs quest for sustainability.

Throughout the academic year the children across ODBST have been running initiatives and projects to see if they can improve the sustainability of their schools and the Trust.

This culminated on Thursday with the Oxford Diocesan Bucks Schools Trusts first annual ECO Conference. Three children from each Trust school were invited to present their projects and findings and then contribute to the ODBST ECO charter that all schools will be following next academic year.



The day started with the representatives from each school giving engaging presentations about the various projects that they had been working on. Some schools focused on reducing their food waste from school dinners, weighing and comparing the waste. They discovered that there was most waste on a Wednesday. They will now be petitioning their school meal providers to change the food options on this day. Other schools focused on the biodiversity of their local ecosystems, creating new gardens and bug hotels. Harriet said 'I enjoyed listening to the presentations. I particularly liked hearing 'Let the Bees Be' I learnt lots of things about bees that I didn't previously know.'

The mornings session closed with pupils from the Trust's 11 schools agreeing on 10 pledges that will help drive the Trust in their quest for sustainability. They will be presenting these to their own schools and continuing with their various projects. In the afternoon, the children made natural bird feeders to take back to their schools as a way in which to encourage a wider variety of wildlife into their schools. Matthew said: 'Making the bird feeders was great. Mixing the lard and seeds was great fun. I hope birds will enjoy feeding on the feeders back home.'

Sulina Piesse (CEO of the ODBST) commented: "Our passionate and forward-thinking next generation of pupils impressed me with their commitment to environmental sustainability. They came up with some wonderful strategies as well as a great Eco Charter for all our family of schools to implement in their own school, reinforcing our mission for a greener and more sustainable planet. I can't wait to see the progress made at next year's Eco summit!"

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

## School improvement news

We are so very proud of our ODBST schools and all that they do for our ODBST children and families. As a school improvement team, we visit each school at least 5 times each year to look at the strategic work that our school leaders are doing to embrace new ideas and ways of thinking



whilst ensuring that the education each child receives is the best it can be. Each school curriculum is displayed on the school website and we are developing this further next year by integrating work around the Green curriculum and how we enable all of our schools to be more eco friendly. We visit lessons, look at books, we talk to school staff, including governors, and children and we talk to parents/carers too because everyone's views matter to us and help us to shape where our schools are. We moderate work across our Trust so that we have a single standard of expectation and we train our staff through an extensive CPD programme. We meet regularly with our Headteachers to offer support alongside challenge and to share the great practice we see in our schools.

#### **School Assesments**

We have introduced new assessment systems into our schools this year through Bromcom and are developing assessments across all curriculum areas so that we have clear overview of where children are and what we need to improve further. Our schools all have varied approaches that work best for their individual context and we have seen some really fantastic platforms where children have opportunities to reflect, review and further improve their learning.

#### **SEND**

Children with SEND or who may be disadvantaged are always a focus of our work because learning can sometimes be harder for them. We want to be sure that all ODBST children are served really well. Schools are mapping out the provision they offer our SEND and disadvantaged children and have really thought hard about how to ensure that all children are included as best they can be.

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#### What has been happening in the Shared Services Team this term?

#### Safeguarding

Safeguarding and keeping our children safe matters to all of us and so we are putting renewed time, energy and resourcing into this so that there is greater focus on what our schools are doing.

We have a single reporting system across our Trust, CPOMS, and a Trust wide strategy that will be implemented from September 23. We have a dedicated safeguarding tab on our ODBST website where everyone can find out more about what we are doing. We are committed to doing the right thing and we make sure that our training and support for school staff is relevant, fresh and sufficiently regular to keep everyone as up to date as they should be.

#### **Attendance**

We have been working hard on attendance too because we know that all of our children need to come to school every day. Time away from school is lost learning and lost socialisation time too; school days are precious days and we want all children to experience as many of them as possible.

#### **New Team Member**

From September 23, we will welcome a new member into our school improvement team.

Rob Halls is an experienced Headteacher and school improvement leader and is very much looking forward to joining us and getting to know our schools.



We feel that this has been a positive year for our schools and we are very much looking forward already to what the next academic year will bring.
