



THOMAS HARDING JUNIOR SCHOOL

ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS 2022-2023

Thomas Harding Junior School is part of the Oxford Diocesan Bucks Schools Trust (ODBST), who are the admissions authority for the school. The Board of Trustees work in partnership over the consultation and operation of the individual schools' admissions policy but hold to the Board of Trustees the agreement to the admissions policies of its academies.

We provide an inclusive, supportive and caring environment, shaped by our core values, in which children can learn and flourish. We welcome applications from all members of the community without reference to ability or aptitude, and irrespective of faith. We ask all parents applying for a place at our school to respect this ethos and its importance to the whole school community.

The Trust has made every effort to ensure that these arrangements comply with the School Admissions Code 2014 and all relevant legislation, including that on infant class sizes and equal opportunities.

In reviewing this policy the Trust Board has had regard to the Equality Act 2010 and carried out an equality impact assessment. It is satisfied that no group with a protected characteristic will be unfairly disadvantaged

Admission arrangements to Year 3 in September 2022

Parents (see Note 1) wishing to apply for a Year 3 place in September 2022 must complete the common application form provided by their home local authority. The home LA is the LA in whose area the parents live at the time of the application. The form must be returned to that LA no later than 13 January 2022 Applications received after this date will normally only be considered after all those received on or before the cut-off date. Offers and refusals of places will be posted by the home LA on 16 April 2022.

There are 60 places available in Year 3 in September 2022

Over-subscription criteria

Children with a Statement of Special Educational Need or with an Education, Health and Care Plan naming Thomas Harding Junior School will always be offered places. If there are fewer applications than places available, all children will be offered places. If there is greater demand for admission than there are places available, the following criteria will be applied in the order set out below:


1. <u>Previously 'Looked After Children'</u> – Trustees have noted the guidance around these criteria from the OSA by including children who "appear to have been in state care

outside England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted" (internationally adopted, previously looked after children - IAPLC). These children will now have the same priority as those looked after and previously looked after children in England. The admission policy criteria for this will be amended to state: "Looked-after children and children who were previously looked after, including those children who appear to have been in state care outside England, but ceased to be so as a result of being adopted."

The admission authority is responsible for determining whether a IAPLC child is eligible and the DfE plans to publish non-statutory guidance before 1 September 2021 when the new Code comes into force (paragraph 1.7).

- 2. Families who have exceptional medical or social needs that make it essential that their child attends Thomas Harding Junior School rather than any other. These needs must be fully supported by written evidence from the appropriate professional person involved with the family. (See Note 3).
- 3. For the main point of entry: Siblings (See Note 5) of children who are attending the school or 'linked primary' school(Elmtree Infant & Nursery School) in Year R – Year 2 at the time allocations are made, and are expected to be on the school roll or linked school roll at the time of the proposed admission, or who have already been offered a place to start in the current academic year at the school or 'linked primary' school.
- 4. Children attending the 'linked primary' school(s) (Elmtree Infant & Nursery School) at the time allocations are made
- 5. Children with a normal home address (see Note 4) in catchment and with a sibling (see Note 5) on the roll of the school at the time of application or whose parent has accepted an offer of a place at the school and who is expected still to be in attendance at the time of entry to the school.
- 6. Children with a normal home address in catchment
- 7. Children with a normal home address outside the catchment and with a sibling on the roll of the school at the time of application or whose parent has accepted an offer of a place at the school and who is expected still to be in attendance at the time of entry to the school.
- 8. Other children.

Proximity of the child's home, as measured by the straight line distance (see Note 6) between the home and the school with those living nearer being accorded the higher priority, will serve to differentiate between children in criteria 1-6 should the need arise. In the event that two, or more, distance measurements are identical, the school will use random allocation to decide which child should be offered the place. The process will be undertaken by the local authority.



All Other Admissions

Admission to the school during the school year depends on whether or not there are places available. All year groups at the school have 60 places.

In-year applications are managed by Buckinghamshire Council and parents should apply directly to the LA in which the school is situated using the CAF and any online portal provided for parent application for school

If there is a vacancy, and there is no child on the relevant waiting list with a higher priority (according to the over-subscription criteria 1-6 above), a place will be offered.

In-year admissions or admissions at the beginning of school years other than Year 3 will only be considered up to half a term [using three term year] in advance of the desired date for entry. For example, for entry in January, the application will not be considered until after the October half term break.

If parents are moving house, the school or Local Authority will ask for evidence of the move, when considering any application for a place. Documentary evidence in the form of a solicitor's letter to confirm exchange of contracts, a rental agreement for at least a period of six months will be required (Armed Forces personnel are exempt). If you are returning from elsewhere, to live in a home that you own, we will require evidence to show that you have returned. We will also ask for evidence that any previous house owned has been sold or is being sold. We would not accept an address where the one given is that of a second home with the main home being elsewhere. If there are two or more homes, we will check which is the main home, and may refuse to base an allocation of a place on an address where the child was resident other than with a parent or carer unless this was part of a fostering or formal care arrangement. We would not normally accept an address where only part of a family had moved, unless connected with a divorce or permanent separation arrangement, in which case we would require proof.

Admission outside normal age group

Requests from parents for places outside a normal age group will be considered carefully by the Local Governing Body, e.g. for those who have missed education due to ill health. Each case will be considered on its own merits and circumstances. However, such admissions will not normally be agreed without a consensus that to do so would be in the pupil's interests. It is recommended that parents discuss their wishes with the head teacher in advance of applying for a place which should still be done in line with the child's normal curriculum year group. It should be noted that if a place in the requested age group is refused, but one in the normal age group is offered, then there is no right of appeal.

Waiting Lists

The Local Authority maintains waiting lists for those children who are not offered a place, and the parents ask for the child's name to be added to the list. The order of priority on the waiting list is the same as the list of criteria for over-subscription, and does not depend on the date on which an application is received. No account is taken of length of time on a waiting list. The school periodically seeks confirmation that parents wish a child to be kept on the waiting list.

After National Offer Day (16 April 2022), Buckinghamshire Council will automatically add the names of the children who have not been offered a place at Thomas Harding Junior School to the waiting list for the school. If you don't remove your child from the waiting list and the Local Authority is able to offer you a place at a higher preference school, they will automatically re-allocate your original offer to another child. It is important to inform the school and Local Authority if you no longer want your child's name to be

included on a waiting list. Details of these arrangements are available on Buckinghamshire Council's admissions websites.

Multiple births

In cases where there is one place available, and the next child on the list is a twin, triplet, etc., we would admit both twins (and all the children in the case of other multiple births) even if this meant exceeding the agreed admission number of 60 for Year 3 in 2022-2023 or the number of places 60 in other year groups.

Fair Access

The school participates in Bucks County Council Fair Access Protocol. Children qualifying under the Fair Access Protocol may be offered a place even if there are no places available in the relevant year group and also take priority for admission over any child on the waiting list.

Appeals

There are established arrangements for appeals against non-admission. Details are available from the school, including the date by which an appeal should be submitted. It should be noted that, in the event of an unsuccessful appeal against non-admission to the school, the school does not consider any further application in the same school year (1 September – 31 August), unless there has been a material change in circumstances, for example a change of address which results in a move from outside the catchment area to inside it.

Parents who wish their children to attend the school are most welcome to visit.

Arrangements can be made through the Admissions Secretary at the school.

Admissions in September 2020

The school received 98 applications expressing a preference for admission to Year 3 in 2020 by the closing date in January 2020. These were ranked as follows, according to our admission arrangements for 2020:

Children in catchment with a sibling in school 7

Children in catchment 23

Children with a sibling 13

Other Children 14

60 places were offered, with the cut-off coming under criterion 5 at a distance of 14.724 miles.

Notes

Note 1 "Parent" is defined in law (The Education Act 1996) as either: any person who has 'parental responsibility' (defined in the Children Act 1989) for the child or young person; or any person who has care of the child or young person. If you are in any doubt, please contact the school for advice.

<u>Note 2</u> By a "looked-after child" we mean one in the care of a local authority or being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of its social services function. Previously looked after children are children who have been adopted, subject to child arrangement orders or special guardianship orders. Adopted children are those for whom an adoption order is made under the Adoption Act 1976 (Section 12) or the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (Section 46). A 'child arrangements order' is one settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live (Children Act 1989, Section 8, as amended by the Children and Families Act 2014, Section 14). A 'special guardianship order' is one appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian/s (Children Act 1989, Section 14A). Applications under this criterion must be accompanied by evidence to show that the child is looked after or was previously looked after (e.g. a copy of the adoption, child arrangements or special guardianship order). Evidence that a child from outside England was previously in state care will be required to come within this criterion. A child is regarded as having been in state care outside England if they were in the care of or were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation, or any other provider of care whose sole or main purpose is to benefit society

Note 3 When applying under criterion 2 (exceptional medical or social needs), you must include supporting evidence from an independent professional person who is aware of the situation and supports your reasons for preferring Thomas Harding Junior School. This supporting evidence must clearly demonstrate why the school is the most suitable and must illustrate the difficulties that would be caused if your child had to attend another school. The person supplying the evidence should be a doctor, heath visitor, social worker, etc. who is aware of your child's or your own case. The school reserves the right to ask for further evidence or clarification where necessary and may seek the advice of appropriate educational professionals where necessary.

A panel comprising of independent education professionals will consider the applications under this rule on receipt of information from the parent to indicate strong reasons for the child attending a particular school. When making an application parents should send evidence from an independent professional person. This might be a doctor, health visitor, or Education Welfare Officer, who knows about the child and supports the application to the school. It must clearly show why the school is the most suitable and any difficulties if alternate schools were offered. The panel will consider which children can be considered under this rule prior to each admission round.

Note 4 By normal home address, we mean the child's home address. This must be where the parent or legal carer of the child lives with the child unless it is proved that the child is resident elsewhere with someone else who has legal care and control of the child. The address should be a residential property that is owned, leased or rented by the child's parent/s or person with legal care and control of the child.

To avoid doubt, where a child lives with parents with shared responsibility, each for part of a week or month, the address where the child lives will be determined having regard to a joint declaration from the parents stating the exact pattern of residence. If the residence is not split equally, then the relevant address used will be that at which we are satisfied that the child spends the majority of the school week. Where there is an equal split or there is any doubt about residence, we will make the judgment about which address to use for the purpose of determining whether or not to offer a place. We will take into account, for example, the following:

- any legal documentation confirming residence
- the pattern of the residence

- the period of time over which the current arrangement has been in place confirmation from any previous school of the contact details and home address supplied to it by the parents
- where the child is registered with his/her GP
- any other evidence the parents may supply to verify the position.

We may ask for evidence of the normal home address in the form of a recent bill. This could be, for example, the most recent Council Tax bill, utility bill no more than three months old, a current TV licence, buildings and contents insurance, mortgage statement or rent book which shows the address concerned. Parents who are unable to provide this evidence should contact the school to discuss what evidence might be acceptable. If it becomes clear or if there is any doubt that the parents and child are not living at the address given on the application form, the school may seek further evidence. The school works closely with the LA to ensure that places are not obtained at the school on the basis of false addresses, and, in cases of doubt, will take steps to verify the information provided. If a place at the school is offered, and it later becomes clear that the offer was made on fraudulent or misleading information (e.g. a false claim to living in the catchment area), and the school has denied a place to a child with a stronger claim, the school will withdraw the offer of a place. The offer can also be withdrawn even after the child has started at the school.

We regard a child's home address to be where he or she sleeps for the majority of the school week (Monday to Friday). We may ask to see official documentation, such as a child benefit book or medical card if there are reasons why a child does not live at his or her parent's address. For example, if he or she is resident with a grandparent, this needs to be made clear on the application form. If such arrangements are not declared or a relative's address is used on the application, we may consider that a false declaration has been made, and withdraw the offer of a place. Childcare arrangements are **not** sufficient reason for listing another address.

If parents move house after the application has been made, but before any offer of a place has been made, the school must be informed.

If parents are moving, we will ask for evidence of the move, when considering any application for a place.

We would not accept an address where the one given is that of a second home with the main home being elsewhere. If there are two or more homes, we will check which is the main home, and may refuse to base an allocation of a place on an address which might be considered only temporary. Nor would we accept an address where the child was resident other than with a parent or carer unless this was part of a fostering or formal care arrangement. We would not normally accept an address where only part of a family had moved, unless connected with a divorce or permanent separation arrangement, in which case we would require proof.

Note 5 By sibling we mean a brother or sister, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, step brother or sister, or the child of the parent's/carer's partner where the child for whom the school place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling. It is helpful if parents make it clear on the application form where the sibling has a different family name. Where there is more than one sibling at the school, only the youngest should be listed on the application form.

Note 6 Buckinghamshire uses a straight line distance for admission purposes. This is the distance from your child's Normal Home Address, to the nearest open school gate available for pupils to use. They use a computerised system to measure the straight-line distance to your child's address as determined by the Ordnance Survey AddressBase. This is an Ordnance Survey data product that provides a National Grid coordinate and a unique reference for each postal address in Great Britain that is on the Royal Mail's Post Office Address File. This is different to the shortest walking route which is used for transport purposes The Buckinghamshire County Council System is described in the Buckinghamshire local authorities admissions booklet and below:

Objections to and referrals about determined school admission arrangements

Members of the public can make an objection to the Office of the Schools Adjudicator (OSA) if they think that the admissions arrangements of a maintained school or an academy do not comply with the 'School Admissions Code' (the Code) or other legislation relating to school admissions.

All admissions authorities must determine their admission arrangements by 28 February every year, even if they have not changed from previous years and a consultation has not been required. Complainants have until 15 May to contact the adjudicator if you have an objection.

If people wish to make an objection they must complete the '<u>school admission arrangements</u> objection form'
