We have had a great term in that we have not needed to move to remote education for any groups. A new reading/phonics scheme purchased at the start of term is really helping those younger children who have been most affected by the disruption to learning. Rapid progress in phonics and reading is being seen already.

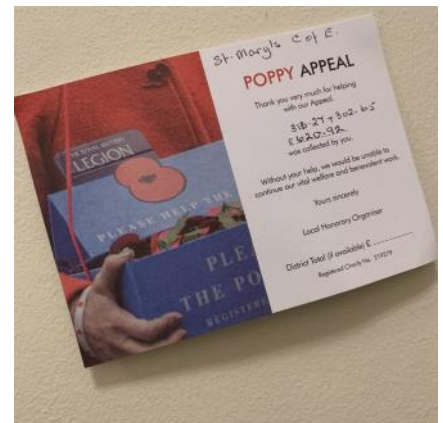

We extended our thinking to consider how we can all be kind and caring and as part of our anti-bullying week we decided we would all work on being extra kind to each other and throw our kindness around!

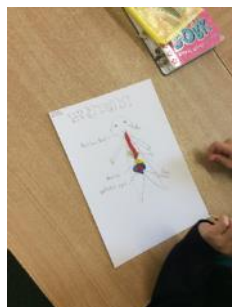

ODBST Leadership Conference

Just before our schools broke up for half-term, Oxford Diocesan Bucks Schools Trust held their first annual Leadership Conference at the Lane End Conference Centre.

The day was kicked off by challenging talks from both Malcom Peckham (Chair of Trustees for ODBST) and Sulina Piesse

(CEO of ODBST), and some collaboration between the groups who were tasked with penning acrostic poems using the letters ODBST. This was followed by a spotlight on wellness led by Sarah Rowe. You can read more on our wellbeing programme later in this newsletter.

Before the break for lunch, there was a jam-packed session delivered by the School Improvement Manager David Cousins, on Ofsted Inspection Updates for the Autumn term. The lecture included a look at the recent Review of sexual abuse in schools and colleges, and how as a Trust we can ensure that we have effective safeguarding in place across the board.

After the conference broke for lunch, the afternoon saw a further four focus sessions. The first of which was a wonderful session led by Lucy McFarlane, Headteacher at Padbury School, on Diversity in Reading – why it matters and what schools can do. This was followed by a look at the Pure Phonics and Cued articulation, developed by Jane Passey and used in Elmtree Infant and Nursery School. Sophie Palumbo took the conference on a practical journey through the



method. The third session was delivered by Lorraine Quirk, Head Teacher of Christ the Sower Ecumenical School. This session pulled on her experiences of making the move from a school regarded by Ofsted as good, to a school in special measures and driving the metamorphosis of the school to unlock its full potential. Closing the conference was David Cousins (ODBST) with session on Character Education. Education for character is already integral to

the work of excellent schools and an integral part of Ofsted's Personal Development judgment. David provided our schools with an opportunity to consider recent guidance and the frameworks developed by the Trust to evaluate and provide evidence of their schools work in this area.

Oxford Diocesan Bucks Schools Trust look forward to running more events, bringing the schools in their Trust together to share knowledge, expertise and best practice to further the development of all the wonderful pupils, teachers and staff that are part of the ODBST family.

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Staff Well-being

At ODBST we recognise the unprecedented challenges our schools and communities have faced in recent times. We are proud of how well our staff have risen to the frequent changing requirements, always ensuring our children are at the heart of what we do.



To support our staff, Trustees have committed to staff wellbeing as a priority across the Trust. We aim to develop a healthier and more positive workplace in each of our schools and across the Trust where employees can flourish, wellbeing is supported, and children ultimately benefit from being around happy healthy adults.



At the recent ODBST Leadership conference and again at the School Business Manager network meeting, a wellbeing session was delivered to both support leaders with their own wellbeing and discuss planned future developments.

The Trust has already implemented an Employee Assistance Programme that provides access to a confidential phone line and numerous resources via an app and portal; increased the Trust's training offering and streamlined a number processes and meetings. Further ideas are planned, and a working group is currently being established to understand which initiatives will really make a difference to our staff. We look forward to being able to share further updates with you in the future.

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Empowering our unique Schools to Excel

Management Information System (MIS) Procurement

One of the many benefits of being part of a Multi Academy Trust (MAT) is purchasing with economies of scale. This was one of the reasons behind the decision to purchase a single Management Information system (MIS) for all our schools. In addition, if this procurement process was managed by the central team, it removes administrative burden on schools and allows them to focus purely on the product reviews of new systems in the market. This would better serve the schools and provide information to the central team and Trustees, which would further reduce workload on schools.

Furthermore, as part of the IT restructuring, the Trust is moving to a cloud based or server free system and wanted this also from the MIS. Many of the new MIS systems are so good that it means our schools can reduce the number of third party applications they purchase, thus save several thousands of pounds over a five year period. E.g. room booking, timetabling, communication, assessment and payment systems. Thus, the Trust began a formal tender process this Summer following time spent on soft marketing. This process is nearing its end and subject to no appeals a new cloud-based MIS will be in place from 1 April 2022 in all our schools.

During the process, bidders submitted written responses detailing their ability to meet each of the Trust's requirements and their suitability to manage the contract. The written responses were carefully evaluated by a panel of members from the central team, a school business manager, a headteacher and a Trustee before meeting each provider for a product demonstration and Q&A session.

RM: New Communication service to enhance digital learning across ALL our Schools



Whether you are a technophobe or a technology geek, you will have realised that technology is now a critical part of our lives – and the lives of our pupils. This includes capacity for future growth as our use of cloud-based systems that will enable us to collaborate across the Trust are designed and then rolled out in the coming months. High speed connectivity will also be particularly important with our move to a new cloud-based MIS from the 1st April 2022.

We took the decision to appoint RM to provide us with new connectivity, telephony and security services. RM are a leading provider of technology & resources to the education sector, with over 20 years' experience of supplying connectivity to schools. As an education only provider their offering is focused on the impact that technology has on teaching and learning. They provide a fully managed connectivity service, allowing us peace of mind that we have secure and reliable connectivity that we can trust to be there when we need it most and to keep our students safe and on task.

- Increased connectivity speeds to all our schools, including separate automated backup connections should any schools internet connection fail.
- Physical infrastructure coming into the buildings with future capacity for growth as the use of online services continues to increase.
- Advanced security and monitoring to protect against the increasing levels of external cyber security threats to our schools.
- Filtering designed specifically for schools, to keep our pupils safe online and an effective alerting system if issues arise that supports the work of our DSL's
